



PROBLEM:

Play the king of spades at trick one. You need two entries to dummy.

BIDDING:

Message from John: By now everyone knows that our Novice and Restricted congress was very successful. The atmosphere was great and the food served up was fantastic. My thanks to the ladies in the kitchen who worked over the two days. You were great.

In November our club is hosting the State Championships for Novice and Restricted Teams. I am sure that we all want that event to be a great success. I would like lots of teams from our club to participate.

You do not have to be a "Champion" team, just a team of 4 (or 6) players. So, please think about it.

By choosing to play a team of six, players have a chance to rest a day or half a day.

What are Masterpoints?

News for Newbies: Masterpoints are points awarded by your national bridge organisation to individuals for success in competitive bridge tournaments run by the ABF.

In Australia we have three types of MP as follow:

Green points are awarded for most club events

Red points are awarded for special Club & State events

Gold points are awarded at major congresses etc

At a normal CCBC session with 10 tables, the top 5 NS & EW pairs will be awarded points.

The top pairs get about 0.3 MP on a sliding scale which ends with the pair in 5th place who are awarded about 0.03 points each.

Periodically these results are sent to the NSW Bridge Association who collate and record each Clubmember's points.

Then, depending on the total number of Masterpoints, there are different Levels that players can achieve.

As an example once you have 2 green points you are at the Graduate Level. The National Level indicates that you have 100 green points and 75 red points. That is a total of 175 of which 75 must be of red value.

At the Diamond Grand level, you have acquired 15,000 green, 13000 red and 5000 gold.

Players who achieve a high placing in a club game, sectional tournament, regional tournament, etc. are awarded masterpoints according to their placing and the number of pairs, individuals or teams who played in the event.

Some events have an upper masterpoint limit, meaning that only players with a masterpoint holding under the limit may participate. This allows less experienced

players more of a chance to place high since they will not be playing against players who are significantly more experienced.

Additionally, some events are stratified. This means that players with various masterpoint holdings play together, but in the final standings, players receive masterpoints based on their position within their stratum. For example, if you are first in stratum C, second in B and fourth in A, and the upper masterpoint limits are 300 for C, 500 for B and 1000 for A, that means that among players with fewer than 300 masterpoints, you did the best. Among players with 500 points or fewer, you did second-best, and among players with fewer than 1000, you did fourth best. With those divisions, a player with 700 points would be able to place in stratum A, but not in B or C.

Masterpoints are partly a measure of skill, but the system is regarded by many players as a measure of experience and longevity rather than skill. Experience is often related to skill, but not necessarily. Over the course of a lifetime, a player can earn many points, just with average play. For example, the same number of masterpoints, and hence the same rank, may have been achieved by Player A over 2 years and by Player B over 20 years.

Your membership also has other benefits - check on your masterpoints, get the monthly abf newsletter, watch Bridge TV and discover other ways to improve your game. A good read of the Federation's newsletter is well worth while and you'll find plenty to follow up.

Díd you know....?????

..... that there's a formal and a wrong way to question the opposition about a bid. If a bid doesn't seem natural, the correct question to ask the opponent's partner when it is your turn to bid is "What is your understanding of that bid?" Not "what does that bid mean?" A bid may have many meanings and the correct wording of your question relates to the opposition partnership's agreed understanding. It is in line with the Principle of Full Disclosure which is the standard that ethical bridge players (and we should all be ethical players) adhere to.

Therefore, whenever you and your partner are using special agreements in play, you must alert the opposition that this is not a natural bid, giving them the chance to ask what is your understanding of that bid.

Further, in relation to the Principle of Full Disclosure, you should not ask a question the answer to which will make no difference to your next play, no matter what answer you get. This MAY be a way to pass unauthorised information to your partner.

If the auction has not been clear, it is probably better to wait for it to finish and then ask for an explanation of the WHOLE AUCTION, not just a specific bid. You may do this:

IF

you are on lead

OR

after your partner has selected a lead and put it face down on the table.

All rules in Bridge are based on honesty and fairness which is inherent in the Principle of Full Disclosure.

Díd you know....?????

....that there's also a proper way to attract the attention of the Director when you need help at the table? It's easy to remember - Director please!
