UPDATE FROM OUR COVID-SAFE COORDINATOR

We are pleased to see the kitchen open, as we see a gradual easing of restrictions. We are now able to use the kitchen as before, but need to be mindful of not having more than 12 people in the kitchen at any one time.

With the 2 square metre rule in place, we can also have 3 people at any one time in the bathrooms.

We are trialling some cloth table covers on the larger tables, as an alternative to plastic. The cloth covers will be replaced daily. Many members have found the glare from the plastic very uncomfortable, so this may help.

As a precaution, we have decided to keep the plastic covers on the Bridgemates, as hand sanitizer can destroy the electronics.

Checking in is mandatory, and Service NSW QR check in is preferred, but laptop concierge check in and a sign in book are available if needed.

Physical distancing, checking in, and frequent use of hand sanitizer continues to very important.

South opens 1H. West bids 2NT (both minors). South plays in 4H. West leads Ace, King, Queen of Clubs. At trick 4 he leads 10 Spades. How do you plan to make your contract?



Plan your play. You're South and in 3NT and you get the lead of the Jack of Hearts. How many winners do you have and how will you make your contract?

Bridge Problems Answers

Hand 1

You must take the spade with the Ace in Dummy and finesse East for the King of Hearts. With West showing 5/5 in the minors it's a fair bet that East has the King of Hearts. If he doesn't, you were never going to make your contract anyway. If the finesse works, cross back to dummy with the King of Diamonds and finesse the King of Hearts for the second time. If it's still not played you can then play your Ace of Hearts and the King will drop.



You have 5 winners

At trick one play your Queen of Hearts. If that wins finesse your diamonds straight away.

However, if the Ace of Hearts comes up in in East's hand and they send back a heart, duck it and then take the King later and work on your Clubs. Either way, finesse into West's hand, which is the non-danger hand.

Bread tags for wheelchairs

Anyone who knows me knows that I'm very much into being kind to the planet and finding ways to reduce, recycle and reuse.

During the COVID outbreak the club had to adapt to the times and provide food and drinks in a way that was safe for our members, and this included having items in individually wrapped packaging. All that packaging was contributing a huge amount of waste to landfill. I then discovered that zip lock bags, cling film and the cellophane wrappers from around the biscuits could be collected and recycled at Red Cycle collection centres, which I have been doing now for a few weeks. If you haven't noticed the little green bin under the table at the refreshment stand that is what is being collected there. With the easing of restrictions that Kerrie outlined we're currently not having to use individually wrapped items but I urge everyone to continue to be mindful of what's recycling and what's rubbish.

Soft plastic recycling is something we can all be doing at home and I would encourage all our members to check out this <u>Red Cycle link</u> to see what can and can't be collected and recycled at Red Cycle collection points. The very exciting news is that Council is trialing home collection of these items and we should all be able to recycle soft plastics soon without having to drive them to the supermarket.

In my research to find out other items that we could all be recycling I came across **Bread Tags for Wheelchairs** and I'm thrilled that Louise has allowed me to implement this worthwhile cause at the club. And it couldn't be easier!

Simply keep the plastic clips from your bread bags or bags of potatoes and bring them into the club. We have a container on the front table for collection. When we've saved up a postal satchel's worth we'll send them off to the charity that coordinates turning these plastic tags into wheelchairs for people in need.
