UPDATE FROM OUR COVID-SAFE COORDINATOR

Greater Sydney, and the Central Coast remain in lockdown until midnight July 16. Our Premier has reassured us that lockdown should end on this date. Our pathway out of this lockdown is yet to be finalised, and made public. We know that mandatory QR entry to premises will remain, as well as hand sanitising and physical distancing where possible. Face masks might be made compulsory, and we will need to wait to see how many people are allowed in premises, depending on the square metre rule that is adopted.

As you know, throughout the pandemic, we have been strictly following NSW Health orders, and will continue to do so to ensure the safety and well being of our members. You can be assured that our club is meticulously cleaned daily. We continue to have QR checkin, quarantine cards and boards, require hand sanitising after every round, maintain strict number limits in our club, and sanitize the Bridgemates after every session, as well as washing and quarantining our table covers.

As the pandemic progresses, restrictions will fluctuate. We have an aged demographic, and are in an indoor space for an extended period of time, so the health and well being of our members is paramount. I expect the wearing of masks will be required from time to time. To be effective, masks need to cover both our mouth and nose. When wearing of masks is required, we kindly ask that all members abide by these rules, and wear masks except when eating or drinking.

Let Me Be Pirect

Whether you feel confident about knowing the rules of bridge or not, if there are ever any irregularities you should call for the Director - that's what we're there for. Each time you call, everyone at the table gets to learn or be refreshed about what should happen in the particular instance that caused play to stop.

As John Redfearn has shared with us, we've had Richard Grenside play in our club on more than one occasion. Richard has Directed the Bridge World Championships so you can safely say he knows the rules of bridge! But even he, when something happens at the table, will call for the Director. It's the right thing to do and calling for the Director in itself is actually one of the rules of playing bridge.

Our Club Directors are going to each share with you aspects of Directing and our first piece is from Steph Mathews who directs Mondays. Take it away Steph!

Director Please!

Some of us may feel bad when an opponent calls the director to the table; others feel reluctant to call the director for a variety of reasons. But the truth is irregularities occur at the table, and the director's job is to determine how to resolve those irregularities and restore equity. Calling the director does not amount to accusing anyone of wrong doing; it simply means that something weird has happened and needs to be fixed.

It is important that you call the director rather than ruling or allowing other players to rule on what should happen. Your opponents or partner may not know the rules as well as they think they do. More importantly, it is the director's responsibility to make such decisions, and appeal procedures are available if the director's ruling is in error. The tone you use when you call the director can go a long way toward making your opponents more comfortable. When the director arrives at the table, the player who called should describe the situation. The director will give others a chance to speak, but the director should control the discussion.

Let Me Be Direct (cont.)

One common situation in which I previously never called the director was when declarer called for a card and from dummy when he should have led from his hand. When this happens dummy should say nothing. If opponents say anything, it should be "Director please!" In the past I would have just asked declarer to lead from the correct hand. I learned at our latest directors' meeting that I should call the director because either defender may accept the lead.

It's also important to get all players' agreement to the number of tricks won before you shuffle your cards and put them away. When there is disagreement, call the director to sort it out; don't try to shout it out. It's not impossible to sort out even after cards are put away, but it's much more difficult

What if you expose more than one card when playing to a trick? What if a card is hidden in dummy or found on the floor after the hand is played? What if an illegible bid thought to be 2 NT is claimed to be 3 NT? There is a rule for almost every situation in bridge, and the rules are designed to ensure fair play and equity.

So when something unusual happens, please call the director and when a player at your table calls the director, don't feel bad!

You are South playing in 3NT. The bidding has gone, 1NT, pass, 3NT, all pass. West leads the Queen of Spades - what's your plan?

Bridge Problems Answers

Hand 1

You have two spade tricks and three heart tricks so you need four more tricks. You have eight cards in both the minor suits but they are split 4/4 in clubs and 5/3 in diamonds. When you take out the Ace you can make 4 tricks in diamonds but only 3 tricks in club so you must work on your diamonds.

Hand 2


Your best chance of eliminating a loser is the trump suit. If East has the King you can finesse and if it doesn't work you still hope the clubs break 3/3. Win trick one in dummy with KC and lead QS through East. If it's not covered then play a small spade to your Jack. If it's still not covered play the 10S. This play will cover a 4/0 split of trump in the opposition hands.

You're able to lead an honour to finesse in this case because it's supported by at least one touching honour (Q J 10).
